From the Chair



A collective voice for the way forward

The State Library of South Australia acknowledges the Kaurna people of the land upon which the Library is located.

The State Library is committed to reconciliation. Respect for the diversity, individuality and equality of all, and recognition of the rights of Aboriginal people are core values within the stories that make us.

We acknowledge that we are at the start of the reconciliation journey and must turn our good intentions into positive actions, with the aim to:

- / work with Aboriginal South Australians to make sure that the Library serves the information and research needs of Aboriginal people and communities
- / partner with Aboriginal people to protect and preserve South Australian Aboriginal heritage
- / recognise and celebrate the contributions of Aboriginal culture and peoples to South Australian society.

The State Library holds a number of significant Aboriginal anthropological archival collections, including the Mountford-Sheard collection, and endorses the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Protocols for Libraries, Archives and Information Services. We have co-developed and subscribe to the National and State Libraries of Australasia (NSLA) Position statement: Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander collections and services in NSLA libraries and the associated titled Position statement: Indigenous Cultural and Intellectual Property.

During the life of this plan, the Library will work to make sure that it employs staff with the appropriate cultural knowledge and skills to sensitively and effectively work with our collections and Aboriginal communities to achieve appropriate collection care and access.

We are committed to supporting the successful development of the Aboriginal Art and Cultures Centre being planned for Lot Fourteen and look forward to our collections adding to the collective knowledge and celebration of Aboriginal cultures.

A Library in transition

As an enduring cultural institution, and the pre-eminent keeper of South Australia's stories, the State Library is embarking on an important transition from a conventional custodian of physical collections to a 'digital first' cultural leader. While staying true to our longstanding purpose to collect and preserve the memories of our state, the Library (in alignment with the [*Arts & Cultural Plan for South Australia 2019-2024*](#)) is embedding acquisition and preservation technologies that will make sure that the events of today can be captured digitally and shared with future generations.

A redesign of our research services will provide a contemporary environment for both professional and recreational researchers to explore topics of interest, drawing on the valuable material that we hold on behalf of the community. Part of this focus is to diversify our collections to ensure that we are reflecting the diverse stories of our communities. Our deepening collaboration with public libraries and expanding digital services will provide library users with a variety of opportunities and channels to engage with our growing collections and expert staff, regardless of their geographical location.

Recognising the changing nature of working life, we are embracing the growing need for accessible and flexible working spaces by expanding our popular community hub and providing a greater amenity for all users. A redesigned larger hub will provide city residents, workers, students and visitors with a modern space to study, meet, and collaborate. Partnerships with others will further enhance our services and ensure a welcoming and inclusive experience for all South Australians.

An extensive program of exhibitions, events and activities will continue to provide opportunities for the community to discover and explore the diverse stories within our collections and will be delivered through traditional and online channels. In partnership with key affiliates, the Library will re-activate the historic Institute, developing and facilitating life-long learning programs that invite participation and contribute to the wellbeing of our community. Collaborating with partners, we will refresh the Mortlock Chamber to tell the stories of South Australia.

All these changes require a flexible, highly skilled team of employees and volunteers. We will make sure that all who work at the Library are supported in their ongoing endeavour to provide excellent care of our collections and service to all users.

We will be accountable for all of our commitments. We will therefore develop a set of measures for each action in this plan, and publicly report on our progress.

The State Library *Future Directions - Towards 2030* provides us with a vision for future success and an action plan that will guide us along the way.
