

# **Exploring your State Library**



As you enter through the main glass foyer you pass over a Kaurna greeting stone. A message prepared by Senior Kaurna elder, Uncle Lewis O'Brien, is carved into the stone. It reads:

Kaurna: 'Munara ngai wanggandi marni na budni Kaurna yertaanna, worttangga marni na budni State Library of South Australia. Ngaityo yungandalya ngaityo yakkanandalga padliadlu wadu.'

English: First I welcome you all to my Kaurna country, and next I welcome you to the State Library of South Australia. My brothers, my sisters, let's walk together in harmony.

This greeting stone reminds us that we are meeting and learning on land that always was and always will be Kaurna land.



The State Library of South Australia is where our stories come alive.

A place where we learn, reflect upon our identities, preserve our memories and gather our knowledge.

## **Visit the State Library Forecourt**

- Gather in a circle around the greeting stone to acknowledge Country.
- The State Library is made up of three buildings.
   Which one do you think is the oldest? Explore the outside of these buildings to gather evidence and identify which is the oldest.

# **Visit the Institute Building**

- Notice the Circulating Library. This was the first library built in South Australia.
- Throughout the Institute there are many photographs from the State Library's collection showing changes over time. What can you notice?

## **Visit the Mortlock Chamber Level 1**

- Step inside the entrance and take a quiet moment to use many senses to notice; look in many directions, listen, smell and feel.
- View the first bay, <u>A trunk full of books</u>. What clues can you see that reveal that this building was once home to the Library, Museum and Art Gallery?
- The State Library keeps more than just books.
   Collection items can tell stories about South Australian people, places and events. How many different types of collection items can you discover?
- View the <u>themed bays</u> and find objects that hold memories or stories for you. Share with a partner.

#### **Visit the Mortlock Chamber Level 2**

- Open an old book from the shelves...smell the pages, feel the paper and read the words.
- Listen to the ticking of the Todd clock. This clock needs to be wound up by hand. It was made by the same person that made the famous Big Ben clock in London.

# Visit the Treasures Wall in the Spence Wing Level 1

- The wall itself is a treasure. Look closely to discover the panels featuring South Australian natural materials and industries such as salt. How many can you find?
- View the State Library's collection items on display. Discover more online at the Library's <u>Digital Collections</u>.
- Notice the three <u>Ernabella Arts</u> rugs designed by artist, Pantijiti McKenzie from Ernabella Arts Inc of the Pukatja Community. Find the original artwork that inspired these rugs. Trace the patterns on the rug with your finger.

## **Visit the Spence Wing on Level 1**

- Look closely at the portrait on the staircase wall.
   Use the public computers near the Information
   Desk to search the <u>State Library website</u> and discover two things about the person for whom this wing was named.
- Investigate the old intertype printing press and discover the news in print over the years.
- Investigate images on the wall of the <u>old butcher</u> <u>shop</u> in Adelaide which used to be a cinema.
   What do you notice? Why might the library collect photographs? Search for more <u>historic photographs</u>.
- Bring in personal research and access the State Library's collections and databases. To help get started visit <u>research tips for students</u>.
